SPOTLIGHT

As I write this we have just celebrated Easter and the risen Christ. So this is a good opportunity to look at Christianity and our faith.

We Christians are often reckoned to be a sad bunch, or least in the opinion of non-Christian western society. Sometimes I think they are right! We must seem a bit pathetic to normal red-blooded human beings as we go to church each Sunday, singing hymns and indulging in all kinds of odd rituals, when we could be cleaning the car, shopping, playing sport or otherwise enjoying ourselves. They could also be right, looking at Christianity itself from a worldly point of view. We worship a leader who had none of the attributes usually associated with success, like wealth and status. His friends were mostly poor, many of them were not particularly well educated, and none of them had any power. They were a ragged bunch, many of whom were on the fringes of society and were despised by decent people. None of them held high office or had any political influence.

To cap it all, that leader of whom they had such high hopes, who was able to work wonders and had the sort of magnetic personality which drew people to him, was executed as a criminal after just three short years of ministry, thus prematurely ending the hopes of all his friends.

St Paul says we are sad people if we have the idea that Christianity is only to do with this life. If that is what we think, we have only picked up a fraction of the full story and we are selling ourselves short, for Christ was raised from death and that makes all the difference. It means that Christianity certainly is a religion for this life, showing us how to live in this life and helping us get to know God for ourselves. But Christianity is also a religion for another life after death.

Easter is the central focus of Christianity and it is a very sharp focus because it is full of huge contradictions. On Good Friday (and many non-Christians may wonder why it is called “good”) the leader of our religion was executed after a rigged trial featuring dishonest witnesses and a great deal of prejudice. By Holy Saturday it was all over for Jesus’ followers. They were plunged into that awful stage of bereavement when nothing seems quite real except the unremitting agony of being without the loved one, that stage when you can’t concentrate on anything except the huge black hole within.

But as we all know now, it wasn’t over. For Christianity it was just the beginning. Despite his well-attested death, many people saw Jesus again alive. Clearly he was alive in a different sort of way, for although less than 48 hours earlier he had been so ill that he died from his wounds, he was now fit and well and left only with scars.

At this distance of time and space it is difficult to know exactly what happened, but we can hold onto the fact that many people saw the risen Jesus, that all four Gospels proclaim it and that St Paul based his whole life upon it. So something very out of the ordinary happened which has made a massive difference to the lives of millions of people since.

Jesus died but then overcame death and remains alive forever. But there is more than all of that. There is this very special promise that after physical death the real person, the real “me” will go on to a new kind of life after death. And for those who have learned to love in this life, that will be a life spent in God’s presence, living and loving with him. Alleluia!

A Personal Thank You

Today it seems as though so many of us are touched by cancer, be it in our families or amongst our friends and acquaintances. You, the people of Chideock along with your community of friends have constantly supported our fundraising events and there will continue to be an ongoing need for this support and for this I want to say Thank You.

When I moved to Seatown in 1999 and became involved with the Chideock Fundraising Group for the then Joseph Weld and Trimar Hospice I had no idea that one day I would need their help in caring for my husband Adrian. In early 2013 Adrian was diagnosed with a rare and painful form of cancer. As Adrian's condition worsened we were put in touch with Weldmar community nurses who visited us and helped with various forms of pain relief medicine together with breathing techniques to assist Adrian with dealing with his pain and make him more comfortable. The Weldmar nurses were always available to talk to over the phone and their regular visits were a constant comfort for us both. Adrian was eventually admitted to Joseph Weld Hospice and there in that safe haven of peace and tranquillity they constantly monitored his pain with different drugs, and they cared for me too. I was able to be with Adrian night and day during his last days. Joseph Weld rescued us when we were unable to cope at home and I shall never forget the care, comfort, support and love they showed to us both at such a difficult time.

COMMUNITY POLICING ...



Hello everybody. I have several incidents to report this month. A number of assaults which took place on the evening of March 19th, at the Tithe Barn in Symondsburry, during a Wurzels and Skimmity Hitchers concert. Dorset Police would like to hear from anybody who has any information relating to these incidents. A key offender who is sought is described as having distinctive ginger hair.

In the early hours of 5th April, key-holders were alerted to intruders at a building site in the centre of Chideock. Police were called and two local youths were located at the site. There were no apparent offences, so the youths were returned home to their parents with strong words of advice given.

Overnight 5th to 6th April, a Land Rover parked at a remote farm near Morcombelake had all 4 wheels plus its spare stolen. There are no lines of enquiry, but crime prevention advice has been given.

There has once again been a significant rise in thefts from unattended motor vehicles at the remote beauty spots and coastal car parks in our area, including at Cogden Beach, Langdon Hill and at Batcombe. Please DO NOT hide valuables in your vehicle, remove them. Offenders watch people hide their belongings, and then strike. Do not become the next victim.

“WHY DO WE BELIEVE IN GOD?”

May is a month at St Giles when we give a special attention to God! ‘Trinity’ Sunday falls on 22nd May, when we think about the threefold nature of God, and Pentecost Sunday (‘Whit Sunday’) is the previous week. It is notoriously difficult to understand the inner workings of God – and many preachers worry about how to make it clearer to their congregations.

Before we can even begin to try to explain God, we need to consider what sort of God we do or don’t believe in! Because there are, as I’m sure you realise, many different beliefs about God according to the various religions of the world. This leads us back to the most basic question of all “Why believe in any kind of God at all?” Many would say that they have no need of God for daily life – although very large numbers do turn to God for help or comfort in a crisis, or at special moments. So is there any rational justification for having a belief in God?

There are classic arguments in favour of belief in some kind of ‘Higher or Greater Power’. The most enduring one is that God is the original creative power or energy behind the formation of this amazingly beautiful world, and who continues to sustain it, in all its complexity. Ultimately we are free to choose whether the evidence is sufficiently strong or not – my faith is that it is better to choose such a belief in God; that then gives a meaningful context and purpose to our existence. I don’t like the alternative belief – that everyone is ultimately random and meaningless chance. This choice also connects me to the personal Spirit at work within the universe and my own life!

The Parish Council will report on what has been done over the past year and the District and County Councillors and the Police will be invited to attend and speak about their work. Representatives of Village groups are invited to give a short summary of their activities.

There will be an "open session" for residents to raise matters which they think the Parish Council should take on board.

If any matter is called to a vote then only people on the Chideock electoral role are eligible to vote.

Please note that the Annual Village Meeting is NOT a Parish Council meeting.

A35 Carriageway Repairs between Axminster and Bridport.

Connect are carrying out repairs for Monday 25 April to Friday 29 April

No works are planned for Chideock itself, but this whole stretch of the A35 will be closed from **8 pm to 6am.**

During the closure periods access will be maintained for residents living within the closure. However, this may only be from one direction only depending on the actual location of the works to be undertaken each shift, and may change where the closures are planned for consecutive nights.

During the closures there will be NO route through the works area for any vehicles with the exception of Emergency Service vehicles on emergency calls.

Please note that the works planned are weather susceptible and dates may be subject to change.

Mobile Library – change to day and time.

The mobile library will be at Foss Orchard Car Park fortnightly on a **Wednesday** from **13:40 till 14:25** starting week beginning 9 May.

This is a change from the current service which is on a Tuesday from 11.00 - 11.45.

Foss Orchard Car Park.

The car park at Foss Orchard is owned and maintained by the Parish Council. The revenue from the ticket machine and season tickets is reserved for repairs to the tarmac etc.

Parking charges apply **EVERY DAY** from 8 am to 6 pm, **FREE** from 6 pm – 8 am.

This is a correction to the information given last month.

Season tickets are available for £10 a quarter or £40 a year.

If you would like to purchase a Season Ticket please contact the Clerk for details.

Mud and other debris on the Highway.

Please note that it is an offence under the Highways Act 1980 to deposit or cause deposit of mud, hedge trimmings, grass cuttings etc on any highway – pavements / footways / public footpaths and bridleways are included in the definition of a “highway”.

Mud, hedge trimmings, grass cutting etc cause a hazard to vehicles, pedestrians and animals and block the rain water drains, which causes flooding.

Public Footpath and Bridleway issues.

Please let the Clerk or a Councillor know of any issues of which you are aware – broken stiles and gates, missing or poorly located signs, overgrown or obstructed paths etc., so that these can be brought to the attention of the Dorset County Council Rights of Way.

CHIDEOCK SOCIETY REPORT

Over 40 people came to find out what was found on last summer's 'dig' on the edge of the east cliff at Seatown. Martin Papworth, a National Trust S.W. Region Archaeologist, demonstrated the difficulties they experienced working in such a fragile area, having to take mattocks to get through over a metre of very hard ground to reach the origin of ancient burnt material which was spotted on the beach by a local enthusiast who had alerted the National Trust.

The N.T. team meticulously dug and sifted three thousand years of history, finding flint tools from a later Bronze Age, pottery, pollens which are being analysed to identify plant life and other evidence of human activity, on ground that was once much further back from the cliff edge. Many items have been sent for carbon dating and unfortunately the results hadn't arrived in time for the presentation, but Martin has promised to send them to us asap.

In a race against time the team dug down past circular ovens, and found a Bronze Age burnt mound, the only one ever found in West Dorset. So what is a burnt mound? Possibly used for ritual feasting, a sweat lodge or an industrial site. Burnt mounds are usually found near a stream and have a trough where heated stones are used to heat water for cooking.

Until the results are in, the answer is still uncertain. So, watch this space!


